EMCO Reports...

Reports on Wherry Housing compliance with improvement requests as well as old and new business of a general nature were discussed at the July 9 meeting of the Employee-Management Council.

EMCO Election of Officers Newly-elected officers of EMCO were Tim Daniels, chairman, and Louis Sidney, vice-chairman.

Wherry Housing A request for a light to be placed over the Desert Park sign at the entrance of the Wherry Housing area was denied due to the overloading of transformers should one more light be added to the circuit.

Public Works will investigate the feasibility of lighting a new pedestrian walkway in the Wherry area. The Wherry Office will take action on painting street signs on both sides so that they can be read from either direction. Although lights are needed over the recreation Park, the Wherry Office deems the installation of floodlights too expensive.

Referral Items The Station's Contract Section, Code 70, will investigate the possibility of painting the unsightly contractors buildings at the entrance of the Station's Main Gate.

A report is pending from the Park Planning group on the final determination of the use of the arid block bounded by Ringgold, Renshaw and Knox which was recently plowed. If the original plan has been abandoned, it should be planted to suppress the sand blown into the surrounding houses.

New Business It was reported that a Safety Shoe Store has been established in the Safety Division of Command Administration Dept. for the sale

of safety shoes.

Management Items At the present time, the outlook for funding for the Station in 1959 looks very good. Although we never have 100 percent of the money to start the fiscal year, we have an unusually good initial start. Retroactive pay will not be taken out, but new pay increases will be taken out of the budget. The restrictions on overtime remain in effect and there are currently only two projects on the Station with authorized overtime.

San Clemente Island A report of medical and hygiene facilities at San Clemente Island disclosed that the over-all cleanliness left nothing to be desired in the BOQs and that the areas were clean and comfortable.

Sufficient personnel are available to administer first aid in case of casual mishaps and medical officers may be obtained with very little delay from the mainland. It is felt that we do need officer supervision but at the present time, we do not have an officer available to send to San Clemente.

Rumors Regarding the rumor that foodstuffs besides milk are going to rise in price, it was announced that foodstuffs other than milk are not subject to California State law.

Dumpster Service Let To Private Firm

Effective August 1 the pick-up of dumpster units containing refuse and garbage will be handled by the contracting firm, Frank Sosa, of San Diego, according to Public Works Officer Capt. G. H. Carrithers.

In accordance with the contract agreement, the dumpster units will be picked up, emptied, cleaned and sprayed as is presently done by Public Works forces.

Cooperation of tenants is requested in placing refuse and garbage inside the dumpster units and keeping the doors closed to promote better sanitary conditions. Large combustible material such as boxes, tree limbs, etc. should be placed at the side of units for pick-up.

The trouble desk, phone 7177, should be called in event of overflow of dumpsters.

Radio Station KRCK Expands News Coverage for China Lake

Starting next Monday morning, July 28, radio station KRCK (1360) will initiate a full-scale Information Service program designed to keep residents of Indian Wells Valley informed throughout the day on all news-developments at local, national, and world-wide levels.

Operating on a sunrise to sunset schedule, the Information Service (IS) program will be heard Monday through Friday weekly covering complete weather forecasting of official temperatures, humidity, and wind conditions; latest headline news at home and abroad; sports; and late breaking news at all levels will be broadcast intermittently.

Of significant interest to residents of China Lake and Ridgecrest will be the "China Lake Report" portion of the morning news roundup which is scheduled to start at 7 a.m., and the "China Lake Headlines" report scheduled for 12 o'clock noon.

Individuals and organizations are invited to submit news items in writing, in person or by mail directly to the station located at 350 West Ridgecrest Blvd., Ridgecrest. These news items will be broadcast in the daily China Lake "Reports" or "Headlines."

The success of this enterprise depends on the interest and cooperation of Station residents in submitting stories and news of local interest. News items which will be submitted by the Rocketeer staff alone cannot supply a sufficient coverage of all activities at NOTS which KRCK is offering for Station news.

This revision in programming at KRCK is a result of recent changes and additions to the station's staff. The present staff, among which are broadcasters of significant radio experience, consists of Bob "Cabby" Lybion, station manager; Denny Gadhos, sports director and public relations; Joe Gallagher, production manager; Norman Woodruff, program coordinator; Lee Maddox, promotion specialist; and Elaine Sunderland, secretary-bookkeeper.

\$6.7 Million Contract Awarded For "A" Sub Navigation Systems

Navigation systems for the first atomic-powered Polaris missile-carrying submarines will be produced by Autonetics, a division of North American Aviation, Inc., it was announced today by the Navy's Bureau of Ships.

Autonetics has been awarded a \$6.7 million contract to design and fabricate the systems which are regarded as the key to the successful launching of Polaris-type Fleet Ballistic Missiles. The Special Projects Office of the Navy's Bureau of Ordnance, which administers the Fleet Ballistic Missile Program, said that the self-contained navigation system must precisely pinpoint a missile-carrying ship's position in latitude and longitude beyond the sight of land or beneath the sea without use of external references, earthbound or celestial.

The Navy has previously announced placing orders for three atom-powered, Polaris-missile submarines. The first two of these are now being built at Groton, Conn., by the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp. The third is under construction at the Mare Island naval shipyard at Vallejo, Calif.


Mrs. Hunsaker will remain until August 1 to inspect and license new and prospective boarding homes for children. Appointments should be made in advance by calling Mrs. Adrienne F. Young, Ext. 72014 or 72015.

According to regulations, the majority of homes on the Station cannot be licensed for more than six children, considering the availability of square footage, napping space, and the age levels of the children. The Station expects to issue supplementary regulations, primarily in the health area.

To date, 10 boarding homes on the Station have been licensed by the county. This is not sufficient to meet the demand which will exist at the beginning of the school year in September. In addition, particular requirements exist for homes catering to the care of infants under two years old.

The broad problem of child care facilities is currently under review by a committee of parents representing a number of departments and activities on the Station. Members of this committee will also be present at the Thursday afternoon meeting to answer questions relating to child care facilities.
