

NOTS Dentists Today Observe 46th Anniversary of Navy Dental Corps

Capt. R. C. Millard, DC, USN, and his six-man staff at NOTS Dental Clinic commemorate the 46th anniversary of the Navy Dental Corps today as they perform their (to them) routine tasks of filling cavities, cleaning teeth, constructing bridges and plates, and, in particular, doing their best to care for teeth belonging to those in military service.

Capt. Millard, one-time collegiate and professional baseball player in Western Oregon, estimates that approximately 2,500 military patients entered the NOTS Dental Clinic offices in the past year, and that some 14,000 "procedures" were accomplished. In the language of the dentist a "procedure" is anything

any office and discounting emergency treatment of military dependent and civilian personnel, the prospective patients list numbers 1,275, and includes all military personnel—both officers and enlisted men—on the Station.

Dental Corps Growth
Growth of the NOTS Dental Clinic parallels the expansion of the Navy Dental Corps. The Clinic here began with one dental officer and one technician; the Navy Dental Corps had its beginning Aug. 22, 1912, when President Taft signed into law the Naval Appropriation Act which included provision for appointment of "not more than thirty" assistant dental surgeons to serve Navy personnel. The Corps has grown to its present strength of approximately 1,700 dental officers, assisted by 3,300 enlisted dental technicians, as well as 70 Dental Service Warrant Officers and Medical Service Corps officers. Men of the Navy and Marines are provided treatment in over 400 dental facilities throughout the world.

Staffed by three doctors of dental surgery, one chief, one prosthe-

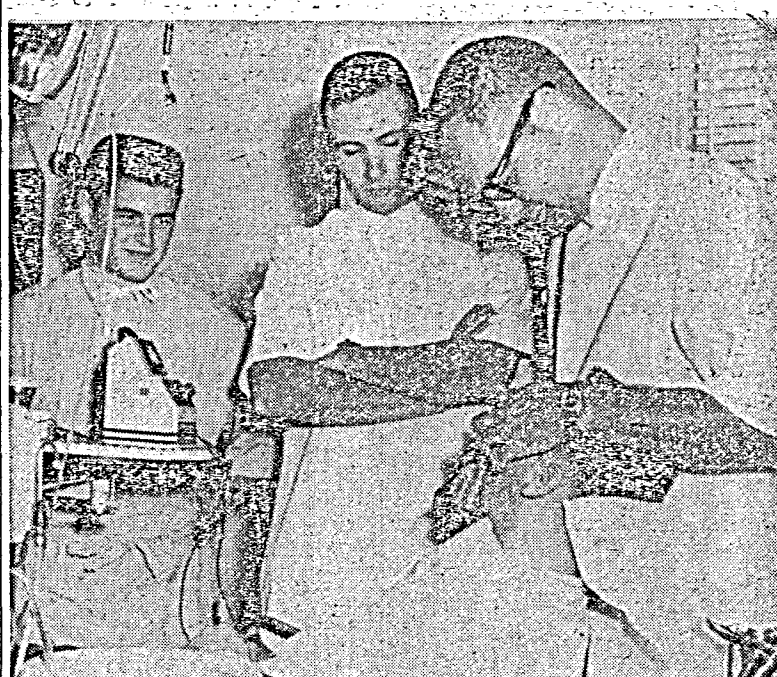

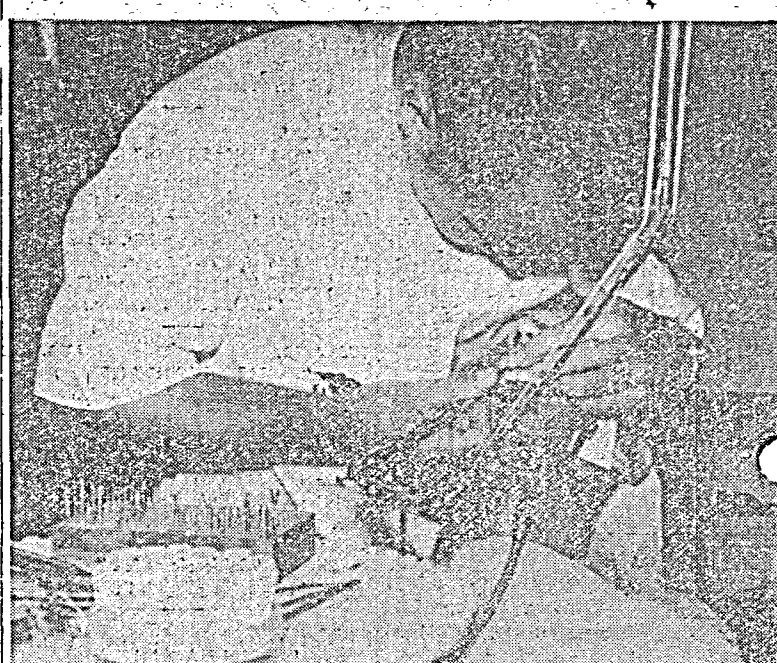

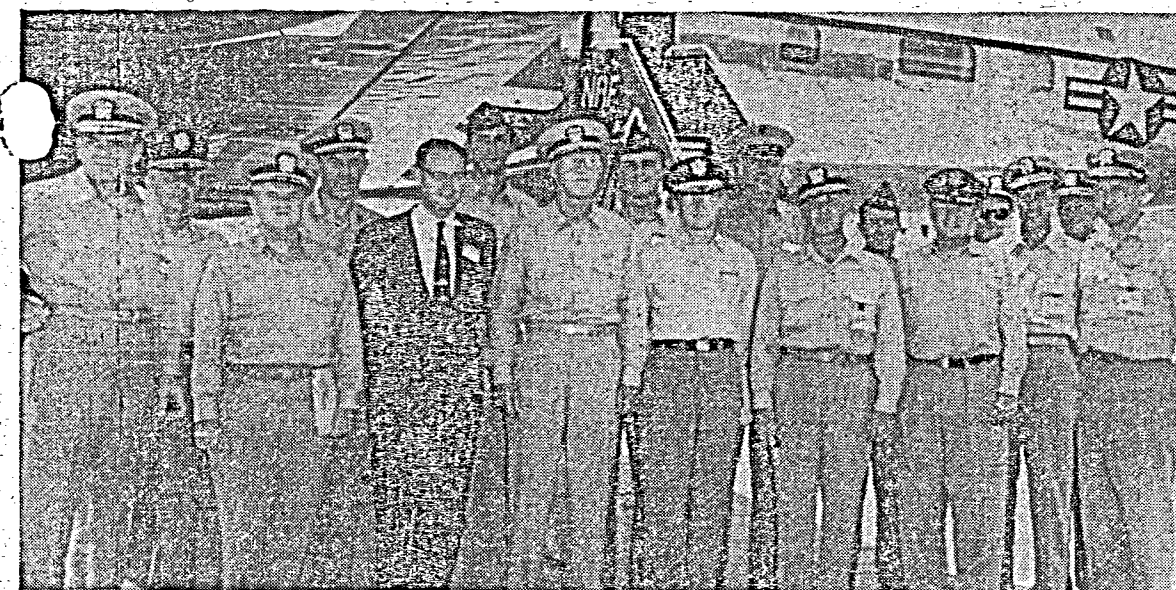

Don't Dawdle— Re-register Vehicles With Traffic Control

Re-registration of vehicles continues at the Traffic Control Office outside the Main Gate. Off-Station residents, as well as those residing in the Desert Park area and on the Station, must re-enroll any vehicle—automobile, trucks, motorcycles—which presently carries a sticker.

Those people whose last names begin with C, D and E are to register their vehicles during the period of August 25 through September 6. The Traffic Control Office will be open Monday through Saturday, 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. until registration is complete.

For the convenience of working personnel, forms for vehicle registration may also be completed at the Michelson Lab Police desk and the CLFP cafeteria. Forms will be available at both locations from 9-11 a.m. and 1-2 p.m. each working day.

When registering vehicles, it is imperative that the owner bring to the Traffic Control Office an active liability and property damage insurance policy, or the latest paid-up receipt for this insurance, and a valid driver's license.

It is requested that only those whose last names begin with C, D, and E, record their vehicles during this two-week period. Stragglers will be given an opportunity to record their vehicles following completion of the alphabet.

Dump 'Off Limits' to Unauthorized People

Grade School District Zoning Outlined

Elementary school district zoning lines were outlined this week by local school officials. Parents are reminded that these zoning lines are subject to change after school starts if class loads indicate that changes are necessary.

Class lists will be prepared by school principals and will be posted on classroom doors, Tuesday, Sept. 2. These lists will be based on registration of pupils new to the district and those in attendance at China Lake schools last year.

Children new to the district who have not yet registered must register at the Burroughs School office before assignment to school and class can be made. All seventh and eighth grade students will attend Burroughs School, so no zoning is necessary for these grades.

Kindergarten registrations during the two-week period which was designated for registration were not complete enough to warrant zoning at this time. Parents of kindergarten children will be notified by card or personal phone call from a teacher sometime during the week of August 25-29 as to which school their children are to attend and what time they will be expected the first day.

The first day session of kindergarten will be organized so that a small group of mothers and children may go to school for a one-hour period. On Wednesday, Sept. 3, classes will be in session for the regular three-hour kindergarten day.

Parents of kindergarten children who have not registered their children are encouraged to do this before next Wednesday, Aug. 27, to insure placement of the children.

Because of the difficulty of visualizing word descriptions of zone lines, it is suggested that parents use the map on the back cover of the Navy Station telephone directory as a reference in determining the grade level zone for each child in the family. Transportation schedules will be published in a latter edition of the paper.

First Grade
Richmond School: First grade zone includes the area north of Halsey and Bowen on the Station, and in the new Wherry tract, an area enclosed by a line starting at the corner of Segundo and Prospect, going west on Prospect to Toro, north to Searies, east on Searies to Segundo, and south on Segundo to Prospect. Houses numbered from 100 through 115 on Searies and houses on both sides of Segundo are included.

Groves School: First grade zone includes the area enclosed by a line starting at the corner of Halsey and Richmond Road, south to Langley, west on Langley to Lauritsen, north on Lauritsen to Independence, west on Independence to Renshaw, southwest on Renshaw to Knox Road, north on Knox Road to Halsey, and east on Halsey to Richmond Road.

Rowe School: First grade zone includes the area to the south of a line starting at the corner of Smith Road and Rowe, going north on Smith Road to Randolph, northeast on Randolph and Ringgold to Independence, east on Independence to Lauritsen, south to Langley, east on Langley to Richmond Road, and south to Yorktown.

In the new Wherry tract, all residents in the area enclosed by a line from the corner of Prospect and Segundo, west on Prospect to Bonita, south to Carriact, including houses on both sides of Bonita, east on Carriact to Segundo, and north on Segundo to Prospect, including houses on both sides of Carriact and Segundo and houses on the south side of Prospect will go to Rowe School also.

Vieweg School: First grade zone includes the trailers and the area on the southwest side of a line starting at the corner of Randolph and Knox Road, going east to Smith Road, and south to Rowe on the Station; and in the new Wherry tract, the area enclosed by a line which starts at the corner of Prospect and Toro, west on Prospect to Bonita, north on Bonita to Searies, including houses on both sides of Bonita, east on Searies to Toro, including houses numbered from 116 through 130 inclusive; and houses on both sides of Segundo.

Second Grade
Richmond School: Second grade zone includes the area north of Halsey and Bowen Avenues on the Station, and in Wherry housing the area enclosed by a line drawn from the corner of Segundo and Prospect, going west on Prospect to Toro, north on Toro to Searies, east on Searies to Segundo, and south on Segundo including houses on both sides of Segundo, to Prospect. On Searies, houses numbered 100 to 115 go to Richmond School.

Groves School: Second grade zone includes the area enclosed by a line drawn from the corner of Halsey and Richmond Road, south on Richmond to Groves, west on Groves to Renshaw, including houses on both sides of Groves, south on Renshaw to Independence, northwest on Independence to Franklin, west on Franklin to Smith Road, south on Smith to Renshaw, west on Renshaw to Knox Road, north on Knox Road to Halsey, and east on Halsey to Richmond Road. The trailers and Wherry housing are not included.

Rowe School: Second grade zone includes the area to the south of a line drawn from the corner of Rowe and Knox Road, north to Renshaw, east to Smith Road, north on Smith Road to Franklin, east to Independence, southeast to Renshaw, north to Hornet, west on Hornet to Richmond Road, and south to Yorktown.

Vieweg School: Second grade zone includes both Wherry tracts except for the area assigned to Richmond School. The west side of Toro and the houses numbered from 116 to 130 on Searies are included in Vieweg zone.

Third Grade
Richmond School: Third grade zone includes the area north and east of a line drawn from the corner of Halsey and Lauritsen, south on Lauritsen to Fowler, east on Fowler to Richmond Road, north to Halsey, and east on Halsey and Bowen to Blue Ridge.
