The tests were conducted by Autonetics, a division of North American Aviation, Inc., at Downey, California.

Installed in a single, separate navigation console, the Polaris guidance system must be given precise pre-launching position information in order for the missile to follow a ballistic trajectory to its target.

The Verdan computer is designed so that its power may be interrupted without loss of stored information. It automatically marks ever a power failure is detected.

Before production units are installed in Polaris submarines, the prototype engineering model is scheduled for additional testing at sea in the test ship Compass Island.
