





NOTS Observes 16th Anniversary Sunday, November 8th



Dedicated to help shorten the war and maintain the peace, the Naval Ordnance Test Station was established 16 years ago, November 8, 1943, by a directive from the Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox as an activity of the Eleventh Naval District under the cognizance of the Bureau of Ordnance. Built on the sandy floor of the Mojave Desert and rimmed by the towering peaks of the Sierra Nevadas and three other ranges, the beginning of what was to become the Navy's largest naval ordnance test station was underway. Its primary function was to provide facilities and services to the California Institute of Technology which was doing wartime rocket development work for the Office of Scientific Research and Development. The original facilities consisted of eight Quonset huts surrounded by 815 square miles of mountains and desert land.



Today China Lake, main facility of the Naval Ordnance Test Station, covers an area over 1,200 square miles. Its modern Federal Housing area provides 3,000 homes for 12,700 military and civilian resident employees and their dependents. With the services of a Commissary Store, Navy Exchange facilities, Church, bank, post office, a theater, recreational facilities and schools, China Lake is the Navy's only fully owned city in the continental United States. Other facilities are NOTS Pasadena, the Morris Dam Test Range, Long Beach and San Clemente Island where underwater studies and sea-range tests are conducted. NOTS products are introduced to the Fleet through a well-integrated team of 1,000 scientists and engineers and 3,600 other civilians supported by approximately 1,200 Navy and Marine Corps personnel,
