Each enumerator in this area has to contact about 450 househcits and the cooperation of all residents is imperative to the success of the campaign. They are expected to complete their jobs within a month's time.

It is estimated that if all the numerators in the United States. missed one person each, the final statistics would be inaccurate by count of 160,000.
