Many inquiries have been received by the Fifth Congress from Universities, government institutions and commercial manufacturers for aid in solving specific problems in their research and development programs. Undoubtedly, the wide variety of equipment, techniques, and personal experience represented at the Congress will provide a basis for solutions to many of these.

The optical instrument array contributed by NOTS is very extensive and covers a large field of data gathering. There are many other areas of endeavor which include guided missile, rockets, aircraft, hyperballistic and hydrodynamics ranges. Overall, the highspeed camera is one of the most useful tools used in this entire spectrum of data gathering by photographic means.
