WASHINGTON—Secretary of Defense McNamara told Congress that he wants all future pay raises for retired people to be based on a cost-of-living index rather than on active duty scales as used before the Military Pay Act of 1958.

He is continuing his support of the Defense Department bill which would recompute retired pay on current active duty rates for about 105,000 persons retired before the last pay raise went into force.

WASHINGTON — The Navy and Marine Corps are shelling out more money for tuition aid and the Navy is making thousands more eligible for educational help.

Under new rules effective March 23, off-duty payments are now made to first enlistment men eligible, men enrolled in high school courses, men enrolled in non-degree and second degree work and extends from six to seven the number of credit hours per semester on which payment will be made.

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon is planning a \$20 million program of fallout shelters for military personnel. The biggest chunk, \$15 million, is to be spent modifying structures on military installations.

USS HELENA — This heavy cruiser and 12 other Navy ships have been selected to take part in the 1962 World Fair at Seattle, April 21-Oct. 21. Rear Admiral Frank Virden, interim commander of the First Fleet, will be embarked in this cruiser, top ranking officer for the more than 3500 men in the 13-vessel group.

## Admiral Stroop, Pirie, Shinn Due Here Next Tues.

Rear Admiral P. D. Stroop, Chief of the Navy's Bureau of Weapons, is scheduled to arrive at NOTS China Lake next Tuesday, April 10, for an overnight stay and inspection of facilities in conjunction with a tour of key west coast Navy installations.

In the party of dignitaries is scheduled to be Vice Admiral R. B. Pirie, DCNO (Air), and Rear Admiral A. M. Shinn, Ass't Chief of BuWeps (Field Support). The senior Navy flag officers are scheduled to visit facilities at Moffitt, Alameda, Fallon and Lemoore prior to their arrival here late Tuesday afternoon.

## Priority Tag Fixed To Pay Legislation

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The scheduling of hearings on proposed federal pay increases is expected to be one of the first orders of business when the House Civil Service Committee holds its initial meeting of the year April 12.

An article published in the Government Standard, official paper of the American Federation of Government Employees, quoted an announcement made by Chairman of the House Committee Tom Murray (D., Tenn.) this week.

It revealed that the April 12 meeting would probably confine itself to getting the committee organized and setting up a legislative agenda.

Pay hearings, according to the statement, are expected to get priority consideration.

The Senate Civil Service Committee is nearing the end of its series of hearings on government pay. The Senate group probably will require two or three more hearings to complete the list of witnesses waiting to testify.

House hearings on pay have apparently been delayed, said the Standard article, in an effort to prod Senate action on postal rate increases. The House has approved legislation to boost postal rates and the bill is now being considered by the Senate Committee.

The Administration wants to avoid lumping together pay raise and postal increase legislation.

Passiontide, the two weeks devoted to commemorating the sufferings of our dear Lord, sufferings which terminated on Good Friday, begins this coming Sunday.

His death was the beginning of a new era for the human race, the turning point in the history of humanity. In Passiontide, Christians begin to prepare worthily for commemoration of events that happened in that first Holy Week. This preparation guides the Christian Era to the mystery of God's love for his creature . . . man.

Do we think often enough on the sufferings the Son of God endured for our sakes during His

33 years on earth, but especially during the last three days of his earthly life? Passiontide calls man to think of Christ's passion and all it means to mankind.

Passiontide suggests to us to draw a veil of prayer and meditation for these few days to shut out from us vain amusements during these last days of Lent, and devote our working hours, where possible, to saying a heartfelt "Thank you, Jesus, for all you did for us. ## Housing Rent Schedule Up For Reconsideration

In the interest of clarifying the rental situation as it pertains to housing at the U. S. Naval Ordnance Test Station the following information has been made available to the Rocketeer.

Assistant Secretary of the Navy (Research and Development) James H. Wakelin, Jr., has recommended to the Assistant Secretary of the Navy (Installations and Logistics) Kenneth E. Belieu, that a reasonable adjustment of rents at NOTS be promulgated. This is being done in the interest of maintaining a high level of professional personnel in this isolated area. He pointed out the unusual costs involved in traveling to urban areas for essential goods and services, and the unique situation in regard to providing equitable rents in comparison with urban communities.

This action followed an analysis completed by contract appraisers which did not allow for an adjustment in rents due to the intangible cost of isolation. He pointed out that there does not appear to be a specific Navy policy in computing this adjustment but that it should be identified and an allowance made in establishing lower rents.

Wakelin suggested in his letter that if the readjustments he suggests are not given a favorable consideration that further studies be undertaken at Navy Department levels.

It should be emphasized that the letter, from which this in-

formation was obtained is still under consideration in Washington. There is no indication at this time that its provisions will be accepted or rejected.

# Predicted Return to NOTS When He Left Decade Ago

Talking with Kenneth W. Heyhoe for the first time is not easy. A quiet, soft-spoken career employee, Heyhoe prefers to be on the listening end of the line.

If you persist, he'll tell you about the farm community of Crete, Neb., where he was born. And, how his father, a professor at Doane College, raised a family of three boys.

You learn early in your acquaintance with the short, blue-eyed Associate Head of Staff for Management, that his wife, Marjorie, is a high school teacher and that his family includes a son, Douglas, 22, and daughter, Karen, 16.

Now in Maryland, they'll be joining him here at NOTS after school is out back East.

Casually, he mentions the changes that have occurred here since his departure for a Washington, D. C. job better than a decade ago.

Our famous "Sidewinder" was still in its infancy of development and some of the other weapons that have brought additional fame to the Navy since that day had not even reached that stage.

Perhaps the most striking change, Heyhoe recalls, is the vegetation that has sprung from the sandy, desert floor since his departure.

"The trees that seem to have reached full growth now were



little more than twigs in the ground then."

Ken Heyhoe impresses you as a man of stability as your conversation drifts back through the years of his career in federal government.

From the day he received his BA degree from Doane College and continued on to receive his

Master's at the University of California and a MS in Public Administration at USC, the young Nebraskan had his sights firmly fixed in life.

He recalled this week that his first year with civil service came in 1941. Three years later, he had earned a Navy commission as Lieutenant and was serving in Washington, D. C.

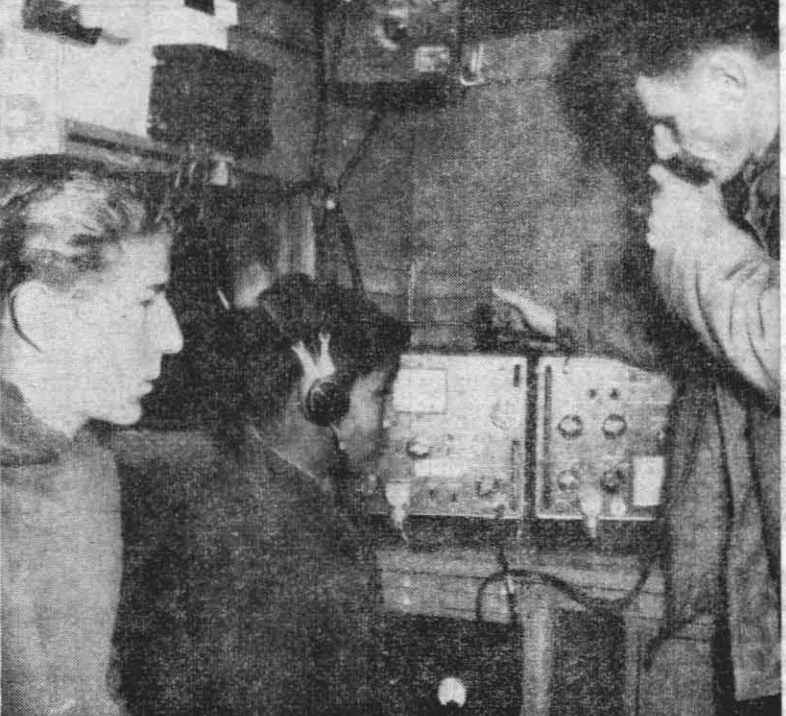
Returned to civilian life in 1946, Heyhoe resumed his civil service career, this time with the Veteran's Administration at Denver, Colo., and two years later was transferred to the early-day, post-World War II Naval Ordnance Test Station, China Lake.

"My wife and I knew that we would someday return to California," he mused, mentioning that he always regarded the West as "home," even when he worked in the East.

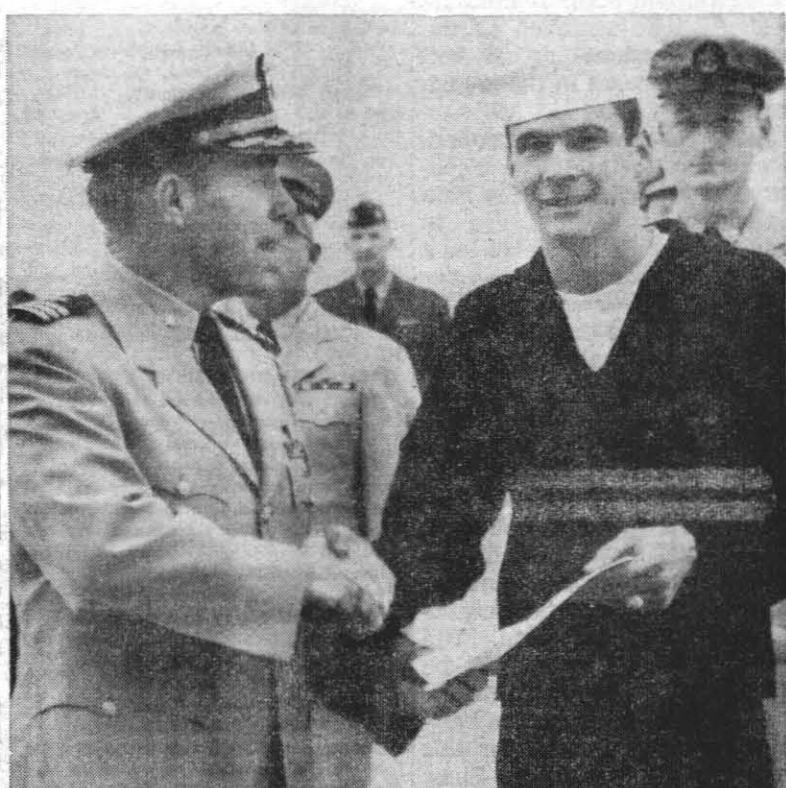

When you've learned this much about Ken Heyhoe, you've done better than average.

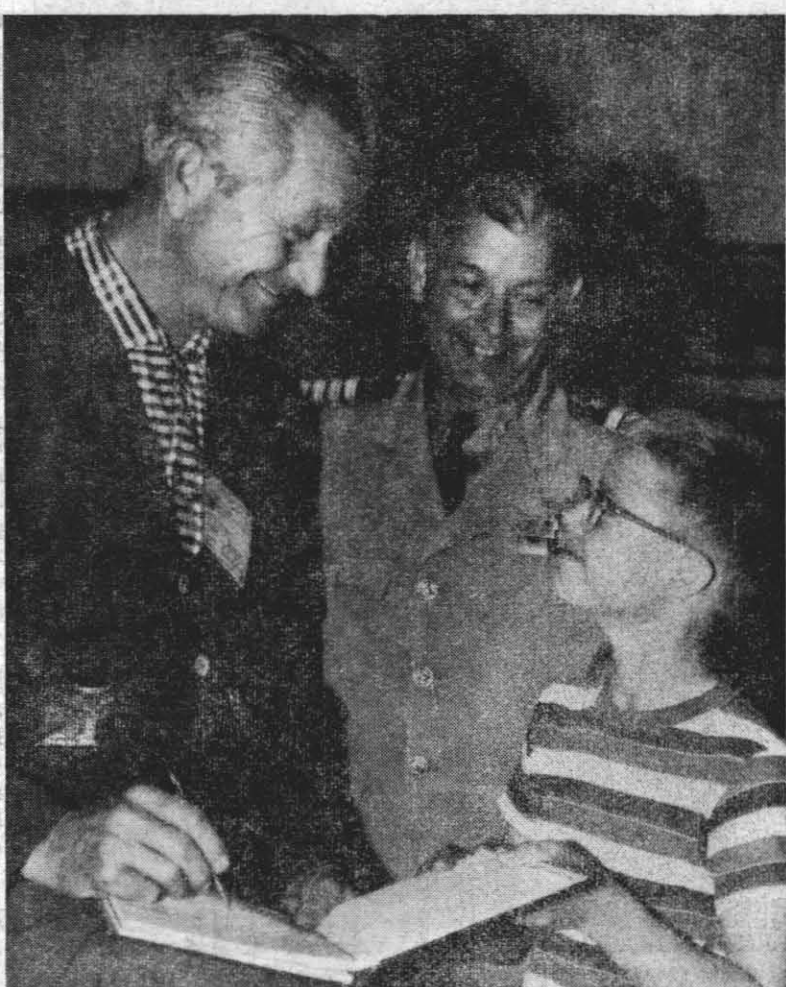
He doesn't usually talk this much.
