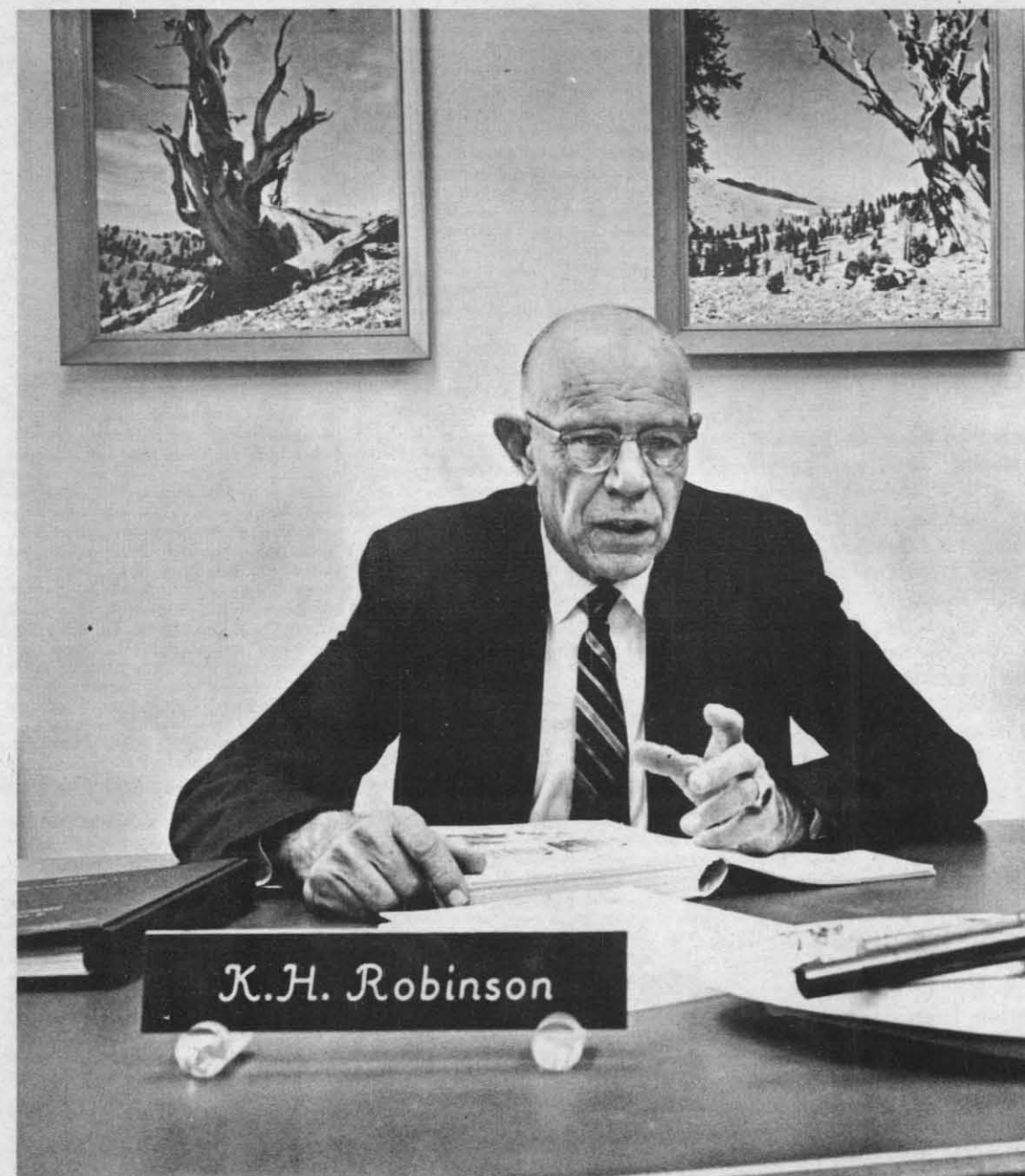

Department Head's Career Spans 26 Years At NWC

Kenneth H. Robinson, Assistant Technical Director for Technical Information and Head, Technical Information Department, will retire August 14, ending 26 years of Federal Service.

Born in Pasadena August 14, 1906, Robinson received his BS and MS degrees from the California Institute of Technology in 1928 and 1929. Following graduation he joined the staff of the Catalina Island School for Boys, Avalon as Head of the Science and Mathematics Department. Evacuated from the Island on December 9, 1941, the School relocated in Montecito, Calif.

In 1943 he returned to CalTech to work on the WWII rocket project in Section 5 of the OSRD effort and was stationed at the Eaton Canyon Plant.

As supervisor in charge of technical procurement, he supplied the equipment and operating needs of the China Lake Pilot Plant and the Salt Wells Pilot Plant during 1944 and 1945. His Federal career began in 1945 when he was appointed Head, Test and Service Division, Explosives Department at NOTS. He held that post until 1949, and during that time the Department performed both Navy and Atomic Energy Commission work. In 1949 he was appointed Associate Head, Ordnance Processing, Rockets and Explosives Department where he was concerned only with Navy programs, and then from 1951 to 1954 was Associate Head, Explosives Department, concentrating on the AEC program.

When the Technical Information Department was formed in July 1954, Robinson was made Head of the department, and he has held that position throughout its 17 years of operation.

Under his guidance the Technical Information

Department has grown from about 90 people—editors, writers, printers, librarians, artists, clerks, motion picture producers, cameramen and the staff assistants and supervisors—to the present staff of 125 permanent employees plus part-time help.

In 1962 Robinson was appointed Assistant Technical Director for Technical Information, in addition to remaining Head of TID. On the occasion of the Center's 25th Anniversary celebration in 1968 he was presented the L. T. E. Thompson award for "his outstanding contribution to the NWC mission through leadership in developing and sustaining an ongoing dynamic technical information function."

Since coming to China Lake, Robinson has immersed himself in the community and civic life. He organized and incorporated the China Lake Civic Concert Association and has held the office of President of that group. In addition, he helped organize and incorporate the Desert Community Orchestra and has played bass viol in the orchestra for many years. He is a charter member of the China Lake Rotary Club and was President of that organization in 1953-54. He is also a charter member of the Indian Wells Valley Council of the Navy League.

As an amateur historian Robinson has always been interested in the past of the Indian Wells Valley. This interest culminated in his work as a member of the founding committee of the Maturango Museum in 1961. He was elected President of the Board of Trustees in 1963 and has served as Director of the Museum since 1964.

For the past 13 years, in his capacity as Head of TID, he has

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NWC Personnel Places 140 Summer Employees

Although summer employment opportunities were again limited this year due to the lack of funding, a total of 140 summer employees were placed. Of those employed there were 8 faculty members; 11 graduate students; 85 undergraduates; and 36 high school students.

Summer employees represented

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46 colleges and universities. Bakersfield College was first in representation with 12 employees and was followed by California State Polytechnic College, San Luis Obispo, California and the University of California, Santa Barbara with 5 employees.

Five high schools were represented with Burroughs High School represented by 20 employees and Trona High School by 11 employees.

Summer employees were placed in various occupations: Engineer, Engineering Aid, Physicist, Physical Science Aid, Mathematician, Mathematics Aid, Chemist, Psychologist, Lifeguard, Warehouseman, Clerk Typist, Clerk and Laborer.

Each year a new Summer employment Examination is announced by the U.S. Civil Service Commission. This Announcement is normally published by the end of October of each year. Individuals who are interested in summer

employment next summer should start applying under the provisions outlined in this Announcement as soon as it becomes available.

It is strongly recommended that students take the first test given. The first test is usually given in January of each year. It is necessary to apply by the first week of December in order to be scheduled for the first test.

Local individuals should check with the Employment Division at NWC by the Thanksgiving holiday period to determine what needs to be done to apply. Non-local individuals should check with the nearest office of the U. S. Civil Service Commission to obtain information, or they may write to the Employment Division, Code 652, Naval Weapons Center, China Lake.

Individuals who are employed this summer who have low scores, or who would like to improve their scores, should apply to retake the test to improve their chances of employment next summer.

The stage was set last month for a significant broadening of operations of the NWC Medical, Engineering and Scientific Working Group (MESWG). Fourteen senior medical officers from the San Diego Naval Hospital met with over 30 Center technologists to discuss ways in which NWC technology may be used to meet specific SDNH medical research needs. Growing out of this discussion, tentative specialty sub-groups were formed which will attempt to set up physician-technologist task teams to pursue biomedical engineering projects and to provide mutual consultation.

The freak, "upside down" Mojave river, a paradox of the California Desert, was featured in Erma Peirson's Desert Scrapbook column. . . With 24 horses now available for rent, the riding stables listed moonlight rides, riding classes, a club room, western style dances, and barbecues as proposed features of the stables. . . A street map of NOTS "headquarters village", published in the ROCKETEER, showed Hawthorne housing under construction and Lexington Avenue as "planned". . . A draft of 84 grinning blue-jackets piled into busses to begin their trek back to civilian life via separation centers at San Pedro and other points. . . Public Works officials held a yard development forum for those interested in the improvement of the yards and grounds about their homes.

SEABEES To Hold Fund Drive To Erect \$2 Million Monument

Richard D. Malone of China Lake, a Reserve Commander in the Navy Civil Engineering Corps, said today a nationwide drive to raise money for a monument and scholarship fund in honor of the Navy's Seabees has begun.

A local committee representing the Seabee Memorial Association will direct fund raising activities in China Lake, Ridgecrest and surrounding areas.

The association hopes to raise \$2 million for a monument near Arlington National Cemetery in Washington, D.C., and for a scholarship fund for children of past and present Seabees. "The project is scheduled for completion next March to coincide with the 30th birthday of the Seabees," Malone said.

The first skilled construction men were recruited and trained to fight shortly after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. Under the initial leadership of Admiral Ben Moreell, the fledgling force was organized into Naval Construction battalions.

A joint resolution providing for the memorial was introduced recently in both houses of Congress. "While the resolution will authorize the association to build the monument, funds for construction and scholarships will have to come from private donations," Malone said.

The President of the Seabee Memorial Association, Inc., is RADM Reider, CEC, USNR-R. Assisting him are ten Vice Presidents, including CDR Thomas S. Maddock, CEC, USNR-R, of Newport Beach, California. CDR Maddock represents the Reserve Naval Construction Regiment One, of Southern California, Nevada and Arizona.

The Association is planning to institute an annual scholarship award program as a living memorial. Awards ranging from \$500 to \$2,000 for undergraduate studies will go to eligible sons and

daughters of active, retired, reserve and deceased officers and Seabees, who have, or who are serving in the Navy Civil Engineer Corps or Naval Construction Force. These awards will be renewable each year up to four years based on continuing eligibility and qualification of the recipient.

According to Commander Malone, the association has contracted Felix de Weldon, the creator of the famed Iwo Jima Memorial to the Marine Corps, to do the sculpture of a Seabee greeting children from foreign lands. The monument will stand in front of a wall portraying the Seabees at work in their construction trades.

"Plans are for the monument to be placed along the Avenue of Heroes leading into Arlington Cemetery," Malone said. "Additionally, awards ranging from \$500 to \$2,000 for undergraduate studies will go to eligible children of past and present members of the Naval Civil Engineer Corps and the Naval construction force."

He said that the awards would be renewable for four years based on the continuing eligibility of the recipient.

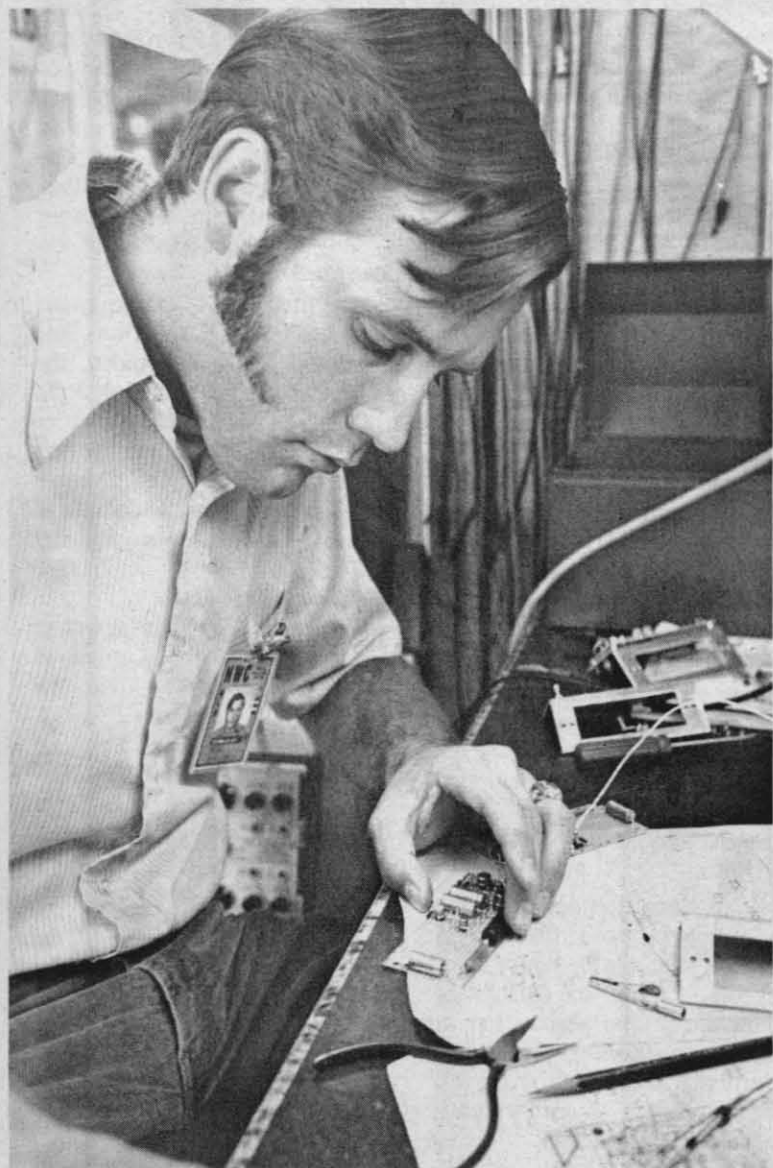

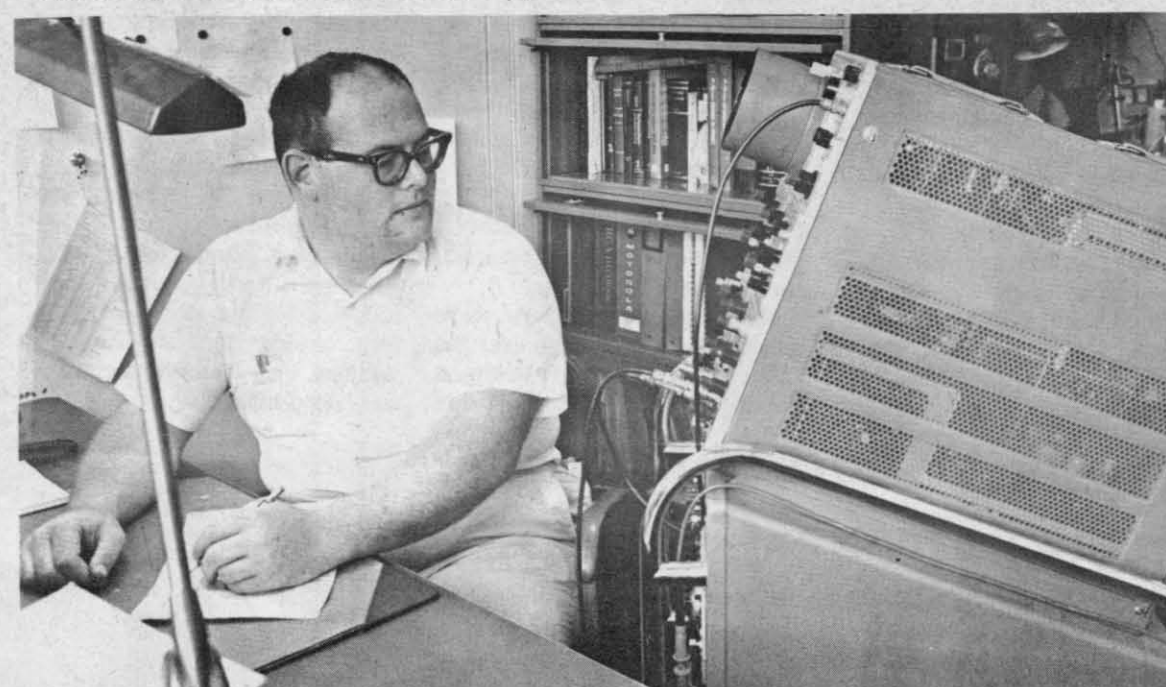

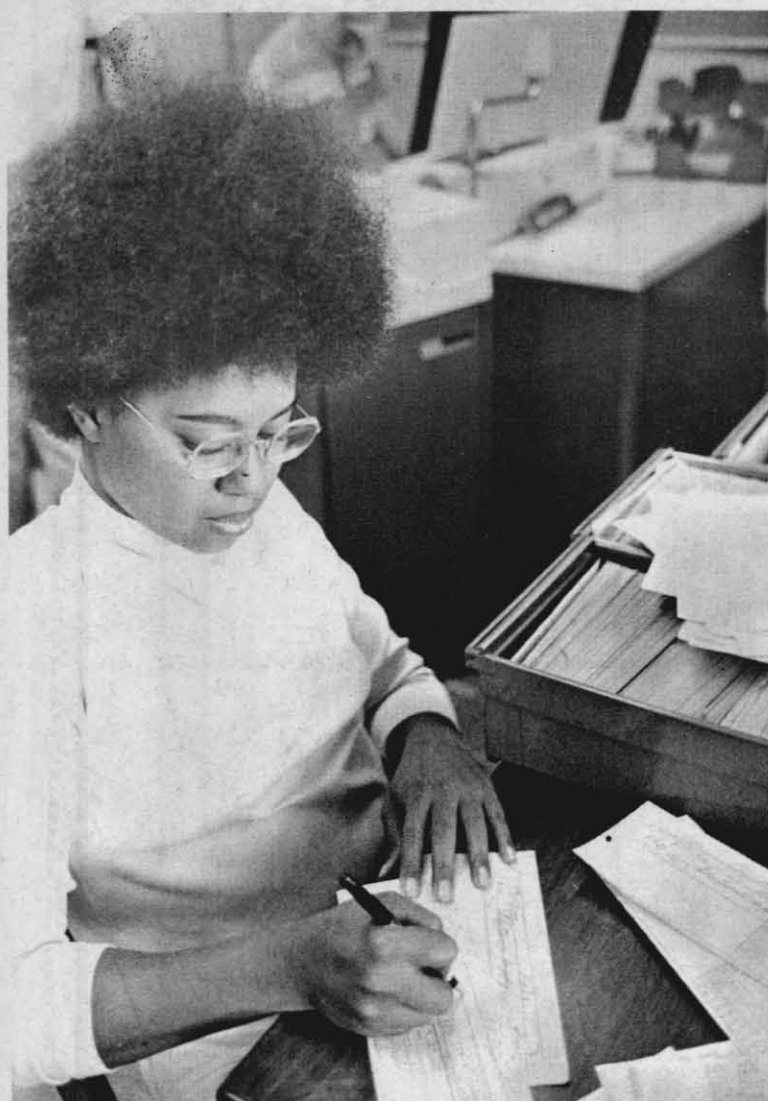

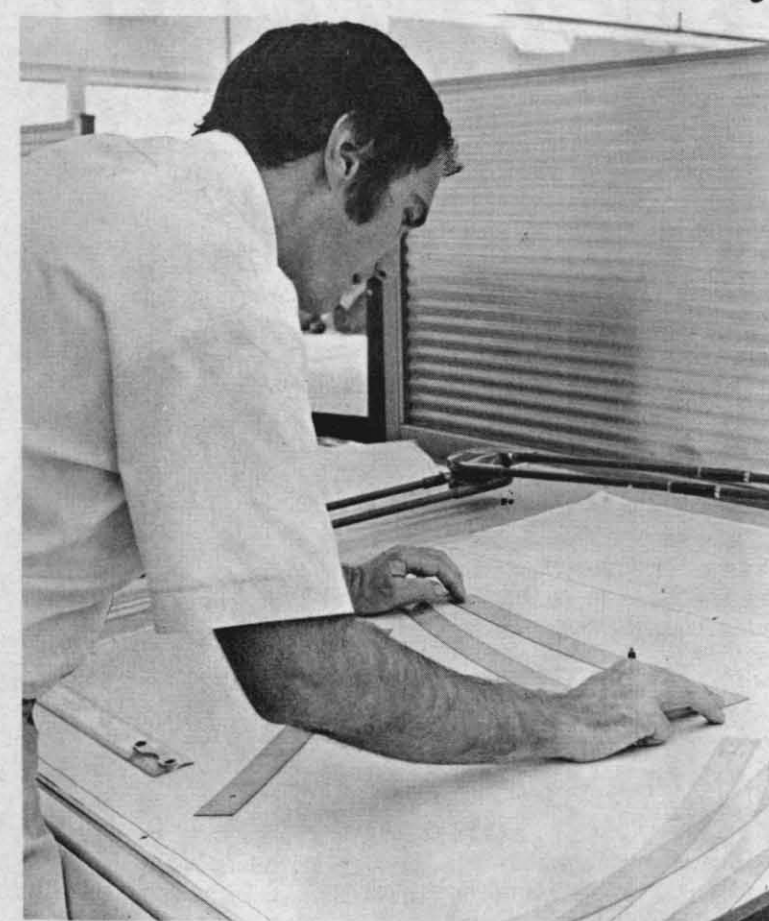
