concise summary of their total military pay and benefits. Since 1981, all Navy members have received PSMCs once a year informing them of the value of their military compensation. But the old PSMC, distributed annually by the Navy Finance Center in Cleveland, was not well received. "Most sailors just got a big laugh when they received this thing in the mail and it said, "This is what your pay is worth,"" said AVCM(AW) Duane R. Bushey, master chief petty officer of the Navy. "They'd laugh and say, 'Good, just pay me that and take all my benefits and throw them in the trash can.' I thought the old PSMC was a waste of paper.'

In contrast to the old generic form that listed pay and benefits as one lump sum, the revised PSMC identifies each pay item and benefit by dollar mined. The cover sheet of the five-page document is a complete breakdown of the individual's total pay and benefits -- direct pay and allowances, special duty pay and bonuses, expense allowances and value of major benefits such as retirement, medical care, death and survivor benefits and federal and/or state tax advantage. The remaining four pages con- needed. tain detailed narrative explanations of all pay items and benefits, tailored to the individual member.

"We tried to use common sense when we worked on this thing, because if it's not a good document we're wasting our time," said LCdr. Ben Lane, assistant for pay allowances policy in the Navy's Military Compensation and Assignment Policy Branch in Washington, D.C. "We want it to be useful and realistic and we think we have a very honest document here." Lane said more than 200 copies of the help you," added Bushey. Navy plans new pay slip

PSMC gives personal touch to summary of total military compensation

The PSMC will be produced by micro-computer ment of Military Compensation will give all Navy at local commands or supporting units from userfriendly floppy disks, which will be distributed Navy-wide by early August. New disks updated with the latest pay tables will then be distributed to commands during November and December each vear

A user's guide is included in the package, enabling the member, with the help of the career counselor (if desired) to input all the necessary information to produce the PSMC. "It takes less than one minute to run through that program on the diskette," said Lane. "It takes longer to print the form than it actually takes to execute the program."

Probably the biggest benefit of the new PSMC will be to help inform and counsel sailors who are considering leaving the Navy. "It gives sailors an idea of their total compensation that they've got to ask for from a civilian employer if they want to get the equivalent," explained Lane. "They can't just amount and explains how each value was deter- consider the pay in their pockets, because there's more to compensation than that." Lane added that he thinks the new form will be an excellent retention tool for career counselors, who will be its main users. Distribution of the PSMC will be a yearly requirement, but he said commands have been instructed to provide PSMCs on demand if they are

The new PSMC should also help sailors when they are seeking credit, by enhancing their financial profiles. "Our base pay is just a little over 50 percent of what our total pay is really worth," said the MCPON. "If you look at that, you don't qualify for much. But if you include your BAS and BAQ and VHA and medical benefits and all that, you qualify for a lot more.

"It's just another way of saying, 'We're here to pie where we're trying to help sailors with financial planning."

Superpower needs military triad

If the United States wants to stay a superpower, it needs a modern strategic Triad, a defense against ballistic missiles, maritime superiority and forward deployment, the vice chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff said recently.

"So long as we wish to remain a superpower, our place is in the arena for global influence -- the place where those who would be superpowers labor," Adm. David E. Jeremiah told the Portland (Ore.) Chamber of Commerce. Using the analogy of the United States as a gladiator, he said America's challenge today is to arm and train the gladiator for whatever waits behind the coliseum doors.

The armed forces must be ready for the known and unknown threats of the coming years, he said. Jeremiah suggested that several requirements should influence U.S. defense decisions. They include continuing alliances with other nations, maintaining maritime superiority to keep trade routes open and to sustain economic ties with many nations, and recognizing that only a limited amount of national resources can be devoted to the military. "We must continue to set the example for the rest of the world, to nourish the many new opportunities for freedom and democracy." American Forces Information Service

Hatch Act stays on the books

Law applies to most executive branch employees even if they don't know it

Recently, a bill lifting Hatch Hatch Act does not infringe on passed Congress but was vetoed did not override the veto, the act remains in full force.

But an informal poll of civilian federal workers revealed that many don't know what the Hatch Act permits and what it prohibits. Some think they can campaign for a partisan candidate while on annual leave; people at the other extreme think they can't even write a letter to the editor as private citizens.

The Hatch Act applies to most employees in the executive tions are not available. branch of the federal government, including part-time and temporary employees. Restric- tions. For example, they may tions also apply when covered employees are on sick or annual leave, leave without pay, administrative leave or furlough. Exceptions apply mostly to ed by the Office of Personnel appointed officials, including the heads of military departments. Consultants are covered only during the 24-hour period of any day in which they are actually employed.

The government's Office of Special Counsel investigates Hatch Act violations, According to office spokesmen, Thomas Jefferson once suggested that federal employees "should not take any part in the business of electioneering." But not until 1939 did Congress determine that government employees' partisan political activity had to be limited if public institutions were to function fairly.

> The most severe penalty for a Hatch Act violation is removal: the minimum penalty is suspension without pay for 30 days. Every year, the Office of Special Counsel sends numerous warning letters to employees for activities that may violtate the act, but figures on numbers of actual viola-

Federal employees may be candidates in non-partisan elecserve on a town council where no other candidate represents the Democratic or Republican party. In certain communities designat-Management where the majority of residents are federal employees, an employee may run as an independent candidate against partisan candidates. However, employees should first check their agencies' regulations regarding outside employment.

Covered employees may:

- ·Register & vote as they choose; ·Assist in non-partisan voter registration drives;
- •Express opinions about candidates and issues:
- ·Participate in campaigns where no candidate represents a political party:

•Contribute money to politcal organizations or attend fund-raising functions;

·Wear or display political buttons or stickers:

·Attend politcal rallies or meet-

·Sign nominating petitions; and ·Campaign for or against referendum questions, constituional amendments and municipal ordinances.

Look for an increase of moisture, producing says fishing has slowed down due to the full moon. thundershowers in the afternoon hours over the Perch fishing is fair, especially on the east side of High Sierra, notes the Bishop Chamber of Commerce. Bishop should see overcast skies in the afternoon with a chance of scattered showers. As for the fishing, well, it seems like summer re-runs of last week.

The full moon is responsible for a slowing trend for most of the area, except South Lake, which is possibly the best fishing around.

John from Big Pine Stations says the best spot in the Big Pine regions is Big Pine Creek, with Tinnemaha running second. Fishing at Baker Creek is only fair.

Ed from Parcher's Resort in the Bishop area reports about 10,000 trout have been stocked in is best with a fly and bubble, powerbait or salmon South Lake so far, with more on the way. Fish

should run between 12 to 16 oz. each. As for bait, the fish are biting anything! Trollers should go down about seven colors. Browns are starting to show up at South Lake. Recently, two were caught that measured 18 and 20 inches. Sabrina Lake is also a good fishing spot. However, the best times is in the early morning as the afternoon hours have been quite stormy. In the case of a vehicle accident, for example, we should not assume that the government will automatically pick up the tab. Even in "small" accidents, a government driver, whether in a governmentowned vehicle or a government-rented vehicle may have to pay for damages if the accident was the employee's fault. This applies not only to the damage to the other vehicle or the property of others, but to the government-owned/rented vehicle. Likewise, a non-DoD civilian, who through culpable negligence, "rear-ends" a government vehicle may be forced to pay for the damages to the government vehicle.

Of course, vehicle-related accidents are not the only instance where government employees or others could be found legally obligated to pay for damages to, or the loss of, government property.

Being on official travel does not provide an automatic blanket of protection. For example, a special agent of the Drug Enforcement Administration, whose wallet contained \$1,185 in cash travel advance funds, was stolen from his locked motel room while he was sleeping, may not be relieved of liability for the loss since travel advancements are considered to be loans. He is indebted to the government for the

Federal law and regulations require aggressive action to collect claims which the government has because of loss or damage to government property. Classes are available concerning your responsibilities and liabilities while on government travel. You may call the office of the Staff Judge Advocate at NWC ext. 2203 for more information. Other incidents such as spills, falling items, negligence and improper use of government-owned equipment have also resulted in the government employee being held responsible for payment. The bottom line is -- be careful -- the money you save may be your own.

A point that seems to be often overlooked or forgotten by many of us is that when an active duty military member, DoD civilian, or anyone damages government property, he or she can be held liable.

Ok, so it may be a funny way to name a new software application. But, it does get your attention! Score one for the marketing department at FGM, Inc. for comng up with this name for a new Macintosh desk accessory that translates a wide variety of graphics file formats to PICT2.

PICTure This requires the use of a 32 bit Mac with System 6.0.2 or newer system software. Additionally, if you are going to be converting file formats which contain more than 256 colors (e.g. Amiga HAM and all PC Targa formats, except 8 bit format) you will also need the 32 bit Color QuickDraw file.

PICTure This will translate more formats to PICT2 format than any software currently on the market; at least that I am aware of, let us know if you find one that does more. Among those formats which can be translated are: on MS-DOS, Targa (8, 16, 24, and 32 bit), CGM, PC Paintbrush .PCT, uncompressed .TIF, Lotus' .PIC and .BIT, Dr Halo's .CUT and GEM's .IMG; on the Amiga, IFF/ILBM and RIFF (first frame only); Sun Raster on Sun Workstations; CompuServe GIF

and RLE for all microcomputers; on the Mac it will translate uncompressed TIFF, Letraset **RIFF and PixelPaint Version 1.0;** and X-11 Bitmap on any system that supports the X Window graphics environment. How's that for a mouthful?

You can save a converted file in two different ways; to a Mac PICT2 file or to the clipboard. While it is faster to save to the clipboard it also eats up memory, and an image can also be pasted directly into a document. If on the other hand, you need to save a copy of the translated image for multiple usage in the future, you will want to save the image as a PICT2 file. Unfortunately, there is no convenient way to convert multiple files of a particular type in one fell swoop. By Bob Beane

High priorities set for retention and recruitment of the Navy Nurse Corps

Retention of Nurse Corps officers and recruitment of highly motivated and capable Nurse Corps candidates are priorities of Navy medicine today. The variety and number of programs have never been better for anyone interested in a nursing career. These programs are available to active duty nurses, corpsmen, qualified enlisted, Naval reservists, college and university students and working civilian nursing professionals.

The Navy Nurse Corps is comprised of 70 percent nurses who have baccalaureate degrees, 13 percent are master's prepared, with 11 percent diploma graduates and three have doctorates. Male nurses comprise 26 percent, and approximately 53 percent of the Nurse Corps are married.

Areas of opportunity in the Navy Nurse Corps include clinical practice, staff nursing, specialized nursing such as peri-operative and critical care, nurse anesthetists, family practitioners, educators, clinical consultants and researchers

Navy Nurse Corps members are required to not only function as clincians, educators and managers, but also as commissioned Naval officers. Congress established the Navy Nurse Corps on May 13, 1908 with 20 initial candidates. Today, there are approximately 3,000 Nurse Corps officers on active duty.

Programs include the Nurse Corps Baccalaureate Degree Completion Program (NCBDCP), Nurse Candidate Program, Full Time Out Service Training (FTOST), Nurse Corps NROTC, Medical Enlisted Commissioning Program (MECP), Technical Nurse Warrant Officer (TNWO) and the Armed Forces Health Professional Scholarship Program (AFHPSP).

Recently, the U.S. Treasury Department announced that effective Oct. 1, \$50 and \$75 denomiwill no longer be issued to partic- ods. The minimum denomination available to payroll savings participants beginning Oct. 1 will be the \$100 bond, which has a purchase price of \$50.

This change does not affect over-the-counter sales of savings bonds. The \$50 and \$75 denomination bonds will continue to be available for purchase through financial instituions across the country.

The Treasury policy states that employees now buying \$50 and \$75 bonds will not be required to complete new bond authorizations. Current allotments should be automatically applied to the purchase of a \$100 bond following notification of employees.

Effective pay period ending Sept. 22, any deducitons for Series EE Bonds for \$50 and \$75 will be discontinued. The \$18.75 and \$37.50 deductions are no longer valid at that time.

The new deductions for the \$100 bonds are \$12.50 for four pay periods, \$6.25 for eight pay periods or \$25 for two pay peri-
