Air Warfare Center taking shape Secretary Cheney says realignment includes China Lake, Pt. Mugu

Last Friday, the Secretary of Defense recrealigning 28 other sites. The Naval Weapons Center was named as one of the sites recommended for realignment.

The long-anticipated announcement proposes that as an integral part of the navy's RDT&E, engineering and fleet consolidation plan, functions performed by the following activities will be consolidated under the newly created Naval Air Warfare Center (NAWC): -Naval Weapons Center, China Lake, Calif. -Naval Air Development Center, Warminister,

-Naval Air Test Center, Patuxent River, Md. -Pacific Missile Test Center, Pt. Mugu, Calif. -Naval Air Engineering Center, Lakehurst, NI


-Naval Air Propulsion Center, Trenton, NJ. -Naval Ordnance Missile Test Station, White Sands, N.M.

-Naval Weapons Evaluation Facility, Albuquerque, N.M.

Naval Avionics Center, Indianapolis, Ind.

The mission of the NAWC is to be the ommended closing 31 major U.S. defense Navy's full spectrum RDT&E, engineering facilities, 12 minor facilities, and reducing or and fleet support center for air platforms, autonomous air vehicles, missiles and missile subsystems, weapons systems associated with air warfare, and for sensor systems used to conduct anti-submarine warfare from air platforms. NAWC is organized into two major divisions: the Aircraft Division, located on would be achieved under realignment. sites at Lakehurst, N.J., and Indianapolis, Ind., and a facility at Trenton, N.J.; and the Weapons Division, located on the west coast with major operating sites at Point Mugu and China Lake, and a facility at White Sands, N.M. > This announcement initiates a process of review by the base closure commission, and until recommendations of this commission are finalized, presidential approval is obtained, the congressional review period has elapsed, and appropriate environmental documentation for impacts associated with implementation has been prepared, no realignment or closure subject to the provisions of the base closure



The personnel impact at the Naval Weapons Center will be minimal. The proposed-realignment impacts to the Center workforce indicated in the Secretary's news release show 160 civilian billets "out" and 29 civilian billets "in". The billets "out" represent a potential savings in overhead staffing that

It is anticipated that the proposed billet reductions can be achieved through yearly attrition at the Center which normally exceeds 200 personnel. The 29 billets "in" represents the proposed transfer of technical functions from other sites to the Naval Weapons Center. The specific functions will be further defined during the consolidation process.

The Naval Weapons Center has much to offer the Navy and the Naval Air Warfare Center through consolidation and will also benefit from the closer working relationships and common support functions with the other Naval Air Warfare Center Activities. More information on the realignment process will be announced when available.

THREATCON, not need for security, ends

Despite cancellation of THREATCON ALPHA, China Lakers will see several security measures staying in place, noted Don Cortichiato, deputy head of the Safety and Security Department. "We would not be wise to totally forget there are terrorists out in the world," he said.

Visible security measures which will remain in effect include parking restrictions; limited hours for some gates, while others remain closed; frequent vehicle and package inspections; and continuation of requiring at minimum a vehicle driver to have a NWC or military I.D. badge to come aboard without logging in.

Roy Parris, head of the department, explained continuation of showing identification upon entering the Naval Weapons Center provides a measure of security that didn't exist before.

In addition, implementation of the THREATCONS pointed out security measures which needed to be corrected, noted Parris. "For example," he said, "before the threatcons, people were allowed to park next to security-controlled buildings and fenced compounds on-Center. Upon implementing the threatcons, we established parking perimeters where they should have been all along. We are just correcting a situa- (Continued on Page 11)

tion which should have been corrected a long time ago."

Two changes from ALPHA requirements will allow parking in front of the Administration Building and limited parking within the Michelson Laboratory Complex which will be closely monitored.

According to a memo from Sterling Haaland, NWC laboratory director, parking will be allowed in the Michelson Laboratory Complex (via the West Gate) for mobility impaired handicapped personnel and government vehicles, with certain restrictions. Government vehicles are not to exceed one hour in the compound. Any exceptions must be cleared by Richard Smith, facility coordinator, on a case by case basis and noted in the West Gate log. Violation of the one hour parking limit will be reported to China Lake police by the West Gate guard.

Contractor vehicle entrance is restricted and those contractor vehicles allowed access must follow the one hour time limit.

According to Parris, limiting access to the laboratory compound will help clear vehicle congestion in the compound, facilitate security patrol and hopefully prevent future material loss from the compound.

Gate openings and hours will also be affected by the continued

CHAMPUS explains "adjunctive" dental care

dental benefit (available to all CHAMPUS-eligible persons) is very limited. The only time dental care is covered is when it's a medically necessary part of medical treatment that's covered by CHAMPUS. This is called "adjunctive" dental care.

For example, an oral surgeon may have to remove broken teeth as part of the medical treatment for an injury. Or, a medical probadmitted to the hospital for dental the latter case, CHAMPUS pays S.C. 29501-0099. for only the hospital part of the

CHAMPUS's "adjunctive" care, and for any care that is medical not dental.

In such cases, you must get approval in advance from the CHAMPUS dental claims processor before you get adjunctive dental care from a dentist.

Hospital ships journey home from Persian Gulf

Persian Gulf (NNS) -- The remaining crews of the hospital ships USNS Mercy and USNS Comfort are preparing for their journey home. Both ships redeployed more than one-half of their crews before setting sail from the gulf.

The more than 2,000 medical professionals, support personnel and Military Sealift Command civilians assigned to the hospital ships spent their deployments preparing for a massive job that they were never called to do.

"You won't find a crew anywhere that is more delighted to have spent so much time being bored," Capt. Paul Barry, commanding officer of Mercy's medical treatment facility, said. "Being bored was a good thing for people in our position."

After many months of standing by ready to assist, Mercy did get the call to treat 21 Americans and 2 Italian former prisoners of war following their release from Iraq. "This justified our whole reason for being out here," Petty Officer Mark Busam said. "The ship has a place in history now.... I felt really proud just to be around these people."

Mercy treated more than 6,000 outpatients from sea and land-based units in the area. More than 650 patients were admitted to the facility's 15 wards, and more than 280 surgeries were performed. Mercy's optical lab was in operation within five days of the ship's deployment and created 873 pairs of glasses. Additionally, the ship filled more than 16,000 prescriptions, took in excess of 5,500 x-rays and conducted 21,000 laboratory tests.

Comfort treated more than 8,000 outpatients and 700 inpatients during her seven-month deployment. Comfort had been on station in the gulf since September 8, 1990.

As the two hospital ships sail home, they continue to provide medical support to fleet and land units. The medical facilities maintain emergency, operating room and intensive care capabilities. The ships are operated by the Military Sealift Command.

Mercy is expected to return to her homeport of Oakland, Calif., by the end of April. Comfort is bound for Baltimore, Maryland, and expects to arrive in mid-April.



Promotions for senior enlisted ecouraging

Washington (NNS) Advancement opportunities for the most-senior enlisted grades remain stable in spite of projected manpower cuts.

The percentage of chiefs and senior chiefs who will be promoted in Fiscal Year 1992 will remain about the same as the previous three years, according to Capt. Rich Robbins, enlisted community manager for the Bureau of Naval Personnel.

Ouotas which have already been provided to the E-8/E-9 selection board translate into a 24 percent advancement opportunity for E-8s working for master chief, and a 13 percent opportunity for chiefs trying to make E-8 in Fiscal Year 1992.



Secretaries are important professionals at NWC

(Editor's note: this is the third in a series of articles in conjunction with Secretaries Week. Special presentations and a luncheon by the NWC Corporate Secretaries Board will highlight Secretaries Day, April 24, at NWC. For information, contact a division secretary.)

Today's secretaries are more than just typists and receptionists. They are professionals performing an integral part in the accomplishment of the Naval Weapons Center's mission. Following Total Quality Management guidelines, secretaries in the Engineering Department formed a Secretaries Improvement Action Team (SIAT) in April 1990.

Fired with enthusiasm, this team tackled a variety of concerns and issues relating to their positions and duties during weekly meetings.

One of their first accomplishments was to establish a Code 36 Secretaries Mission Statement, Code 36 Secretaries, Taking Pride in What We are and What We do: Professionals In Action. People Helping People Through PARTNERSHIP and TEAMWORK!

Since its beginning, SIAT has designed and implemented a desk sign to help visitors when the secretary is absent, a special secretaries routing sheet for passing information quickly; instituted a monthly secretarial newsletter called The Professional Image; implemented a secretaries' communication network; and started a library of educational cassette tapes and books for secretaries.

The group has also established a recommended listing of training classes for each secretarial level and a Code 36 Training Recognition Program. Secretaries can also make use of a Secretary's Desk Manual designed for the Engineering Department by SIAT. The manual includes information specifically gathered on the department, departmental procedures and many samples new secretaries can follow.

During monthly lunches, SIAT presents speakers, videos and demonstrations to help department secretaries expand their potential.

The 1991 SIAT is continuing work in TQM by developing creative ways to help employees get the job done; establishing a mentoring system for new or inexperienced secretaries; establishing computer uniformity; and promoting and improving customer relations.

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
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


