Rebuilding China Lake's patent program and successfully protecting the Navy's interests in China Lake inventions recently earned members of China Lake's Patent Counsel Office the Naval Weapons Center Team Award.

Capt. Douglas W. Cook. commander, and Bill Porter, technical director, of the now disestablished Naval Weapons Center, presented the awards to Melvin J. Sliwka, Harvey A. Gilbert, Stephen J. Church, Donald E. Lincoln, Stuart H. Nissim, Gloria J. Erickson, Shelley D. Salisbury, Debra J. Kuehn and Joy Adams.

According to Sliwka, head of the Patent Counsel Office, in 1988 the Chief of Naval Research and the commander of NWC asked him to reinvigorate the Navy patent program at China Lake.

the establishment and improvement of high quality health programs. NWC was one of six organizations so recognized.





Captain Craig, if you review all these calls that come in, I wish you would go out to the airfield and try to get through that darn turnstile. The other day, only one person's badge would work! Those turnstiles are no good. They are a hindrance, making people late for work, late for meetings and getting a very bad attitude.

#### And ....

There seems to be a problem with your turnstiles. The one at VX-5 has been broken for the past four days now and the other ones always seem to be messed up. There's always someone there working on them. We need to review this problem and get it fixed. It took us over ten minutes to get through the gate and we almost missed a flight. It's not a lack of planning on our part, but a lack of good, working gates. Thank you.

And more ....

Captain, I appreciated the article in the paper about the turnstiles, but I think it whitewashed the issue. If you had been standing out there yesterday, with 100 people standing in the rain trying to pass their badges through again and again, and then passing their badges through to others because some badges won't work, you'd know something isn't right. There is definitely something wrong with the system. Thank you.

#### Answer

There have been several problems associated with implementing the flightline security fence. I can assure you that everyone involved with the implementation has heard enough complaints to be sensitive to your concerns, and are doing their best to address them. As a reader of The Rocketeer. I am sure that you are aware that the flightline fence represents the initial phase of implementation of the physical security requirements for aviation assets. The system has been operating well since the problems occurred during the rain. During the Feb. 18-20 time frame we averaged 1453 people per day going in and out of turnstile #1, 2114 for turnstile #2 and 1317 for turnstile #3. We have centralized the reporting process for those who have problems. A call to China Lake Police Dispatcher at 939-3313 should result in someone being there to help in five minutes or less. Since this process was fully implemented on 18 February, there have been only three calls per day for assistance. Although a single call may represent a delay for multiple employees, it certainly appears that the system is working much better.

#### Ouestion

The motorcycle parking area on the west side of Michelson Lab is on a hill. This makes it extremely awkward to deal with and I do not feel safe or comfortable using it. Thank you.

Answer

Thank you for your concern in regards to the motorcycle parking at the west gate of Michelson Laboratory. The Station motorcycle instructor looked at the parking area and attempted to foresee problems that could occur in parking or holding the motorcycles up. He felt that anyone with the skill necessary to ride should not incur too much difficulty. In the motorcycle course given here at China Lake, the students are taught how to properly mount and park a cycle and you may want to sharpen your skills by taking the course. entire distance. The purpose of the event is to create a groundswell of support for all American Prisoners of War and Missing in Action (POW/MIA).





## General Colin Powell touts 'joint warfare' in preface of new book published by the DoD

When a team takes to the field, specialists come together to win. Each does his or her best because the other players and the hometown count on

So it is when the United States goes to war. And it is necessary to win every

"This is our history, this is our tradition, this our future," wrote Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, in the preface of the new Joint Warfare of the U.S. Armed Forces. He started the document, called "Joint Pub 1," seven months before publication. The theme of the 80-page, historically illustrated work appears on the front cover: "Joint Warfare is Team Warfare."

The book's two-fold purpose,

according to Army Col. Pete Herrly. special assistant to the chairman for Joint Pub 1, is to shape doctrine and to reinforce attitudes among military leaders. "(The purpose is) to reinforce the value of joint warfare and how you fight it, and our way of operations short of war," explained Herrly.

Joint Pub 1 is one of 168 joint publications in various stages of development, Herrly said. With a print run of 300,000, it will be distributed to war and service colleges and various service training facilities. It will also go to active and reserve component military personnel ranked at and above major and lieutenant commander, sergeant major, master chief petty officer, chief master sergeant and civilians at or above GM/GS-15.



## **MWR** celebrates fitness month by opening gymnasium May 8





putting in place a state-of-the-art law office and patent support system which other Navy laboratories are now just beginning to consider employing," reads the citation signed by Capt. Cook, now the vice commander of the Naval Air Warfare Center Weapons Division.

The citation continues, "Also, highly competent and aggressive patent personnel were recruited, who not only performed their normal patent duties in an outstanding manner, but also successfully challenged and defeated one of the most prestigious patent law firms in the country in litigating two patent interferences."

Sliwka said a patent interference is when more than one party claims the rights to an invention. "The United States Patent And Trademark Office must decide who has the right to it," he explained. "While very few Navy patent teams have attempted to handle interferences in the past, we not only challenged one of the foremost law firms in the country, we womped their tails good!"

This success brought four new patents, which Sliwka said could lead to several patent licenses for the Navy.

Sliwka said interference litigation is very time sensitive. "If you miss one deadline, you lose," he said.

The expertise of the China Lake Patent Team is recognized by other Navy patent offices who frequently call for advice and guidance, Capt. Cook noted in the citation letter. The team's expertise is also recognized by the United States Navy, Office of General Counsel, who requested the team to make a presenta-






# TD lecture: NASA's Laser Power Beaming Program

John D. G. Rather, assistant director for Space Technology (program development), NASA Headquarters, Washington, D.C., will talk about NASA's Laser Power Beaming Program at the Technical Director's Lecture slated for 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 13, in Room 1000D in Michelson Laboratory.

NASA has developed a concept for a laser power beaming system known as Space Laser Energy (SELENE). It involves a 10 MW free electron laser and a 10 to 12 m adaptive optic mirror to beam the power to space. One of the most attractive sites for this system is near China Lake. A discussion of the advantages and key technical requirements of this system will be given.

tion on patent interference litigation during its January conference.

Since 1988, the Patent Team has grown from one senior attorney, one junior attorney and a part-time secretary to its present team. During this growth, they have increased processing disclosures from 24 to around 89 a year, Sliwka said.

During the past three years, the team has produced a total of 152 new patent applications and 178 amendments, which are responses to United States Patent and Trademark Office actions. Sliwka said.


While the attorneys' knowledge and experience are critical in litigation efforts and processing disclosures, Sliwka said they couldn't do it without their support team. "Lots of paper is generated during a litigation," Sliwka said. "Our support team stayed late and worked weekends getting everything typed and out on time. Our success has definitely been a team effort."

With the creation of the Naval Air Warfare Center Weapons Division, the China Lake Patent Office has assumed the additional responsibility of managing the patent program at the Point Mugu site. Sliwka urges all NAWCWPNS employees to file patent disclosures as rapidly as possible and promises his office will attempt to process them in an expeditious manner so the interests of the Navy, NAWCWPNS and inventor are protected

# RESCUE **China Lake participates** in city-wide disaster drill

Most China Lakers probably didn't feel the magnitude 6.5 earthquake rock the area last Thursday morning. Only a handful felt the shocker and reported for duty at the Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake Emergency Operations Center (EOC). But most employees

probably did experience the aftermath of the quake as every department aboard the NAWS took part, to one extent or another, in the

annual disaster drill. On the last day of Earthquake Awareness Month in California, the Navy, the City of Ridgecrest, Kern County and other area governmental agencies simulated a major shaker to test the emergen-

cy plans for the area. Aboard the NAWS, at least three buildings, and Murray Junior High School, were collapsed or suffered major damage in the simulation.

Cdr. Chip Mills, NAWS China Lake executive officer, who ran the EOC, said he was very pleased with the drill's results and the effort put into planning the exercise. Larry Stensaas, emergency management officer for China Lake, echoed Cdr. Mills views on the success of this drill. He noted it was the first time the Navy had worked extensively

with the City of Ridgecrest's EOC and that effort also went well. Also for the first time, the Sierra Sands School District got heavily involved with all schools tasked to respond to some kind of emergency on site.

For China Lake employees, evacuat-

As has been the case in past drills of this nature, communication breakdowns was the biggest problem area. All the Ridgecrest data was fed to the public works EOC representative via the public works net, placing a burden on that department's radio network. Another communication problem discovered was the inability of cellular telephones to work effectively inside the NAWS EOC, a metal building surrounded with power wires.

Stensaas noted these drills are designed to uncover these kinds of problems in advance of a real emergency or disaster. Another drill is planned later this year.

# **Education a common American Heritage link**

did not disappoint them. When his family moved to Hawaii, James graduated from high school ninth in a class of over 400 and first in a math competition between all the high schools in Hawaii. James indicated he came to China Lake as a Junior Professional because he could pursue a master's degree while working full time.

Dr. Philip Yoo, operations research analyst in Code 3186, certainly agrees with the adage of obtaining as much education as possible. He has a Ph.D. in economics and is working on a masters of science degree in computer science. He believes, as do others interviewed, that one should take advantage of the educational opportunities available, viewing the completion of a degree program only as a milestone in the continuing process of education. He said that in South Korea education is taken very seriously and that to fail brings shame.

Husnu (Hans) Bayburt, physicist in Code 3933, echoes that sentiment. In Turkey, stated Hans, failure in school is a disgrace and, therefore, education is taken very seriously. Because of that, he feels, there are not the behavior problems in schools there as we hear about in this country.

All the employees interviewed emphasized the tremendous educational opportunities, as evident by the large number of schools, colleges and universities, in contrast to the countries they came from.

Horacio Estabridis, electrical engineer in Code 3521, was "absolutely amazed" to see the number of colleges and universities when he came to the United States from Peru.

Most of the employees interviewed indicated because of the fewer number of schools in their original homelands, pursuing an education was a competitive process. Charles Ezeike, electronics engineer in Code 3181, stated the competitive process begins in Nigeria as early as entering secondary school.

Code 3113, said, "Because educational opportunities are so great here, we often do not appreciate an education as much. (In foreign countries) education has greater importance because it is harder to come by. When you work harder to get something, you appreciate it more."

Anyone can take advantage of the opportunities in this country. Just ask Robert Do, electronics engineer in Code 3946. He and his family escaped from Vietnam by boat. They came to the United States with practically nothing. Yet, he and all of his siblings went to college. Four are electronics engineers, one is a mechanical engineer, two have bachelor's degrees in business and one is an electronics technician. For Robert, the American dream is alive and well.

Those interviewed are lending their hands to building a new world-to making a contribution where they are at. Like others before them, they realize that in our country, perceived and real obstacles to attaining their goals can be overcome

## Safety Office sponsors CPR classes

In the event of an emergency, quick and skillful delivery of Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and/or first aid by YOU could mean the difference between life and death of a family member, friend or co-worker.

In a serious accident or in the event of cardiac arrest. first aid can mean the difference between life and death. Do you know what to do in the event of an emergency? If not, here's your chance to learn. It's time again for the Safety Office's annual Summer CPR/First Aid training program.

The Naval Air Weapons Station Safety Office at China Lake, in conjunction with Cerro Coso Community College, is presenting a series of Adult CPR and Standard First Aid classes from June 9 through Aug. 13 at the China Lake Training Center.

The Adult CPR class can serve as either initial certification or re-certification in Adult CPR. Topics covered include adult rescue breathing, how to deal with a choking victim and adult CPR. The full Standard First Aid class also serves as either initial certification or re-certification training. These classes will be presented on Tuesday - Thursday between the dates specified above.


